

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Thanksgiving in Lent

"Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits, who forgives all your iniquity, who heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from the pit, who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy. ... The Lord is merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love."

Psalm 103:2-10.



I write this reflection back from a 3-day Lenten retreat at Canterbury Retreat and Conference Center in Oviedo. The retreat was sponsored by St. Thomas in Eustis and led by Archbishop Greg Kerr-Wilson of the Diocese of

Calgary in Canada. The retreat theme was Building on the Rock of Jesus: Re-ordering our Lives in Lent.

The retreat begun with a reminder that Christianity is centered on the Life, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus. Lent as a season of preparation for the celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus is, therefore, a time when Christians are called to strive to be more like Jesus. We were also reminded that becoming like Christ does not just happen but requires intentional practices that help shape us into the image of Christ. Those intentional practices are generally referred to as Spiritual Disciplines – disciplines that allow the Holy Spirit to transform us. Since Christianity is a corporate body, we were reminded of the importance and power of practicing the disciplines as a body. Among the spiritual disciplines discussed was almsgiving, which according to Archbishop Greg, is a reflection of the very nature of Christ who gave his life for the salvation of the world.

As I reflected on these teachings, I was reminded of our call to join other Episcopalians in the practice of daily thanksgiving through the United Thank Offering (UTO) during this Lenten season. As you might have read, UTO was founded over 125 years ago to help Episcopalians develop and deepen a personal spiritual discipline of gratitude by noticing the good things that happen daily and then giving thanks to God for the blessing while making a thank offering in your own personal Blue Box. As I write, many of you have already received your personal boxes. If not, they are available in the Parish Hall.

While we are urged to give thanks at all times (1 Thessalonians 5:18), Lent is a particularly appropriate time to give thanks. As articulated in our General Thanksgiving, we thank God for His "Son Jesus Christ; for the truth of his Word and the example of his life; for his steadfast obedience, by which he overcame temptation; for his dying, through which he overcame death; and for his rising to life again, in which we are raised to the life of your kingdom." (BCP p.836).

As you consider how you may become more like Jesus during this Lenten season, I pray that the UTO program will be an opportunity for you to join other Episcopalians in not only giving thanks to God for the many blessings of your life, but more so in becoming more like Jesus who gave his life as a ransom of many. (Matthew 20:28). The boxes/envelopes will be gathered sometime after Easter to be blessed and sent to the UTO for distribution as grants to churches with innovative ministries. As previous recipients of a UTO grant that enabled Holy Trinity to buy a church bus to transport some of our members to worship, our participation is an expression of gratitude and affirmation of the UTO mission. Have a Blessed Lent!

February 24, 2023

The School Board met February 22nd. We are glad to announce that Jeanette Rodenbaugh has joined our board as the new Finance Director. Jeanette has been involved with the school as a Tutor, she is also a Counter and serves on the Church Finance Committee. Jeanette was a CPA during her career. We are very glad that she has joined us and we look forward to working with her.

Highlights for February include:

• Our Family / Parent Group continues to develop and we are hopefully close to adding a parent to our Board.

• The budget for next school year (beginning July 1) is close to completion and will be ready for Board review in March following approval of new increased Tuition and Student Fee rates. • The budget will include the addition of a Director of Development. This position will focus on expanding fund raising with a focus on grants, corporate and individual foundations, government grants, and large private donors. This fits our strategic plan to further develop our school's ability to meet our students' needs, make our teaching compensation closer to local market, and establish a foundation for future development.

• Our Curriculum Director working with the Head of School have identified several staff development educational opportunities and we are able to include funds in our budget for helping our teachers continue to learn and improve their skills.

• Funds have been included in the budget to expand and enhance Marketing. Our hope is to develop professional marketing materials and messages that target donors and new student families.

Probably the highlight of the month, at least for me, was to celebrate Ash Wednesday with the students and staff of our school. It is always a reminder of the wonderful progress our students make in our school when I see them participating in our service, reading scripture, ushering, and as an acolyte. A big "Thank You" to Fr. Samuel and Justin (Head of School) for bringing us together to worship as one.

HTES Students attend Chapel

Under the guidance of Fr. Samuel and Assistant Chaplain Nancy Bryson our HTES students attend chapel twice a month. All students, Justin McCallister (Head of School), and other school faculty members gather in the chapel to attend a service led by Fr. Samuel, with music provided by Sara May.

At each service Fr. Samuel offers an opening prayer, students read a psalm and then have a brief conversation reflecting on the theme of the day's service. Mrs. May chooses music, including hymns, that relate to the chosen theme. Currently, the students' services are related to Lent, highlighting the Christian virtues of Wisdom, Truth, Love, and Faith. Each service closes with the school hymn, "Joyful, Joyful".

The bi-weekly chapel session is an important component and the hallmark of the Episcopal identity of Episcopal schools. Students are introduced to the structure and flow of the church service and the Christian faith, and learn etiquette of attending church. For many of our students this is their first faith-based experience and for others their introduction to the Episcopal church.

With the direction of Fr. Samuel, Deacon Bryson, and Mrs. May, students are afforded the opportunity to participate in the service by reading psalms, lighting candles, and serving as acolytes for the Holy Eucharist. These experiences broaden the students' understanding of religion, humanity, and the world. Thank you for allowing our students these opportunities.

Winter Convocation 2023



Joining a religious order has been a life-long dream of both my father and me. It was finding the right one that held my own beliefs about what a religious order should be and believe in. Back in November 2022, I was accepted into the order as a Prospective Postulant. It was done by a zoom meeting of the top officers in the order. I could not be made a true Postulant until the Winter Convocation.

What is a convocation? I had never heard of the word before being involved with the Brotherhood of St. Gregory. All I knew was it is a big meeting of the brothers from throughout the United States. The meeting takes place only twice a year. Once in the Winter and once in the Summer. This Winter, in 2023, the convocation was being held at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Seminary in Baltimore, MD. The convocation was a full week-long from January 23rd until January 27th.

I flew out of Orlando and landed in Baltimore. I took a taxi to the seminary. Your first impression arriving at the grounds are the imposing gates. Twenty feet high and letting you know you are entering something special. We drove around to the main entrance, where again we were greeted with opulence. An imposing structure meant to impress.

I found my way through the building and met the brothers relaxing in the lounge on the lower level. I was greeted warmly and immediately accepted as one with the group. I was given a room key and ushered to the fourth floor where I had a beautiful private room and bath.

I won't go into the day-to-day happenings of the convocation. I could fill two Tidings Publications! But I did want to take you on a tour of a typical day.

On Tuesday, January 24th, my day began at 6AM. I would rise before my fellow brothers and go to the silence of the lounge on the lower level. I said the rosary. At 8AM my 25 fellow brothers and myself congregated in the dining hall for breakfast. I was encouraged to change my seating each meal to get to know all the brothers. Meals were served buffet style. We all lined up talking and laughing, and enjoying the event. I watched the brothers interact with these men who knew each other for years. The convocation was the great moment where old friendships could be rekindled.

At 9AM we met in the chapel for Morning Prayer. We recited the psalms and heard the passages of Scripture. I was asked to sit in a specific place. It was designated for someone new down the list and in line from people who have gone before me.

House Meetings were held after Morning Prayer. At 11:40AM it was back to the chapel for Noonday Prayer. At 12:00 was lunch. At 1:15PM a most solemn event took place, the Holy Mass in the chapel. At 3PM was an educational program. At 5PM was dinner. At 6:15PM was Evening Prayer. At 8:30PM was Compline (Closing Prayer for the day.)

With the end of the official schedule the brothers could retire to the lounge, for good conversation and interaction. By 10PM I was shot and would retire to my room. But for others the evening was just beginning and they remained up to 2 or 3AM in the morning.



My Postulancy Ceremony was held on Wednesday at Evening Prayer. I was presented to the head brothers by my mentor, Brother Gordon. They recited prayers over me. I was presented with a copy of the Book of Common Prayer, and most ceremonially I was ushered into a seat closer to the brothers. I was no longer a Prospective Postulant..... On the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul I was now an official Postulant in the Brotherhood of St. Gregory!

envelope Taco Seasoning
ounce can refried beans
small can sliced black olives

8-ounce jar salsa, mild or medium (I use half mild and half medium chunky salsa)8 ounces sour creamPackage of Mexican blend Cheese(shredded)



Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray PAM in a two-quart casserole dish Brown ground beef and drain fat off Mix in Seasoning package' Put one of two torillas in pan to cover bottom Spread refried beans over tortillas Layer ground beef on beans Spread olives over beef Pour salsa over olives Spread sour cream over salsa Top with Mexican Cheese

Bake 30 min until cheese is melted Serve with tortilla chips (we like scoops)

You can add any other taco toppings like onions or Jalapenos if you like.


