A Recap of Holy Trinity's History

- 1883 A group of Englishmen settled in Fruitland Park and nearby Chetwynd to invest in citrus groves. About 80 signed up by a land company, Stapylton & Co., the head of which was Grenville Chetwynd Stapylton, from whom the colony took its name. The settlers included younger sons of the aristocracy, bankers and businessmen. They gave the colony and church they established an Anglican flavor which persisted through the years.
- **1886** On July 3 a general meeting was called to take steps to provide a church and a rector

The first service of Holy Trinity Mission was one of Evening Prayer. It took place at Stapylton's dining hall at 3 p.m. on Dec. 19, 1886, with 50

people in attendance. Services alternated between the hall and Forest Club's Clubhouse. Only baptized & confirmed Anglicans could receive Holy Communion

January 23 (Sunday)- a temporary church was established in John Vickers-Smith's



barn on Lake Geneva

Church was Erected during the spring & summer; The total cost was \$2,500

At 3pm on **Dec. 2, 1888**, the first Sunday of Advent, Holy Trinity Mission of Chetwynd held its initial service in the newly constructed building. The congregation of 40 gave an offering totaling \$4.96

July 12 HT was consecrated; Lych Gate ConstructedSept. 28 First Wedding performed


1894 14 acres of land donated

June 1- First Confirmation Recorded

- **1895** The town of Chetwynd disappeared following the Great Freeze. Temperatures dropped anywhere from 12-18 degrees, so most crops were destroyed. Many residents were discouraged to see their fruit frozen and fled in panic.
- 1901 40 members listed (15 children) \$127.48 Total Receipts
- **1914** Vestry votes NO to move church to a new lot in Fruitland Park
- 1915Jan. 22 Women's Guild
Established

- 1920Guild Hall land donated, and additional pews
installed (still used today)
- **1925** March church Tower removed for Safety
- **1926** Good Shepherd-Stained Glass Window donated Cost \$550
- **1928** Dec. -8:00 am service added
- 1933 A bequest from Miss Louise Bosanquet on her death established a Perpetual Care Fund
- 1939-1942 Electrical lighting installed
- 1943-1960 Vestry minutes and service book was lost for this period
- **1948** New roof & red carpeting installed

1986	The church's centennial celebration began on February 16. Festivities were scheduled to last over a three-year period, spanning the three years of the church's beginning.

	emergency vestry meeting, 40 children started school (because there was a building available and 3 of the children attended HT). Originally called "Spring Lake Christian Academy" – used to be preschool-12 th & was Christian based	
1997	School name changed to HTES, 12 students in grades 6-11	
1999	A church van was purchased	
2000	HT donated \$3900 to Habitat for Humanity

	HT assisted with the startup of Corpus Christi in Okahumpka	
2005	Name tags used Holy Tees (This is how Holy Hackers started)

2009 Rectory renovated

Church significantly vandalized for the first time, with damages of nearly \$7,000 with a hammer; as a result a security system was installed

A brick paver patio was installed between the church and parish hall

- 2010 A large wooden cross surrounded by Bosanquet Lilies was placed at entrance from patio to cemetery
- 2011 Stained glass windows (Made by parishioners under the instruction of Fr. Ted Koelln) were dedicated in the chapel
- 2014 School enrollment was 22 students, tuition was \$6000, school budget was substantially supported by the church

- **2014** The chapel space was named "Grace Chapel"
- 2015 First school Golf Benefit organized by Jim Kelly. Since then, benefits lead by Jim (3 years), Sid Yee (4 years), and Judy & Gregg Monin (3 years) have provided more than \$200,000 to the school
- 2018 2 modular buildings and 4 new classrooms installed on campus thanks to a \$200,000 gift from Thomas Alles
- 2019 Pet Cemetery was completed
- 2021 Feb. 1 Father Samuel becomes new Rector

March - Parish Hall entry doors were painted red, and the stacked wall project along the parking entrance was completed

May 26 – Formation of School Board, enrollment grew to 43

Sept. - Window project (16 windows) was completed, total cost was \$68,068

- 2022 Vestry voted on the Vision & Mission Statements
- 2024 Walkway from the parking lot to the church was replaced with pavers Lych Gate was repaired after damage to one of the post's bases
